Physician Spotlight: Dr. Conrad Capili

Then he realized he could do that very work right here in Dallas, and is now serving as the new pediatrician at Healing Hands Ministries.

Dr. Capili's parents ran a family practice clinic in Grapevine while he was growing up and attending Covenant Christian Academy in Colleyville. He earned an interesting combination of undergraduate degrees at UTD with a Bachelor of Science in Child Learning and Development and minors in Molecular Biology and Visual Arts. Next he attended Mayo Medical School, which is a part of the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota. He had an elective rotation at Christ Community Health Services in Memphis, which is where he learned he had a heart for such medicine.

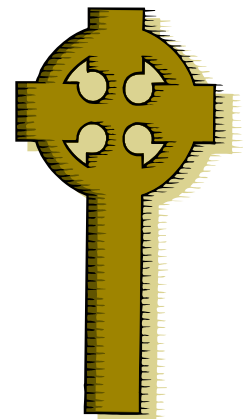

Salvador and his wife Yanita brought their two young sons to the U.S in 2001 seeking a better life. No one spoke English, which was the first obstacle. His first job in his

new country was that of a driver for Catholic Charities with an assistant who spoke only English. While on the job, the two practiced each other's language, and after two years, both were bilingual.

Salvador then went to work on the second biggest obstacle for immigrants – legal paperwork.

A Good Samaritan helped him over that hurdle by stepping up to pay the hefty \$9500 fee, liberating Salvador to join the staff of Healing Hands Ministries.

He will be leading our Community Café, which is an opportunity for our patients to come for coffee and conversation. We have

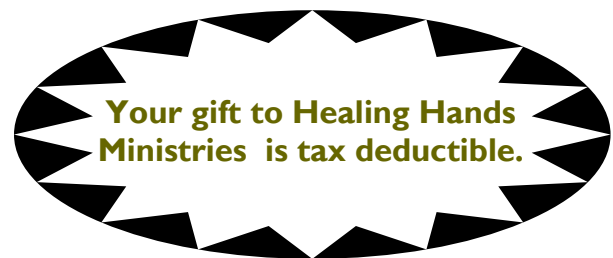
